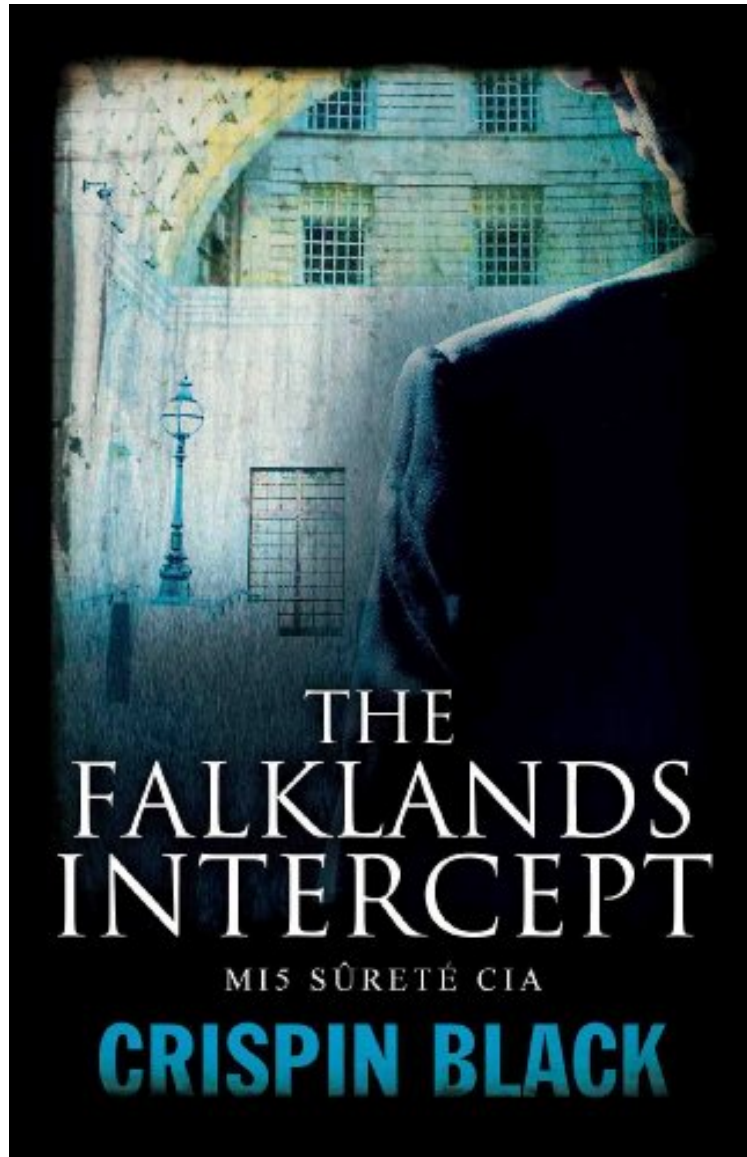

not be fooled: This is not a fast-moving, breath-taking secret agent thriller with one-dimensional figures, nor a Whodunnit Agatha Christie Murder Mystery. It is a thriller, no doubt, but of an unusual kind. In fact, for a thriller, the author allocates surprisingly much time to descriptions of the past and he lets people talk intensely over a glass of whiskey. This makes for a slowly unfolding story and generates a very special epic-like feeling. Not everyone may like this - if you need a shoot-out at every second page, this is probably not the book for you. Anyhow I believe that unusual as it is, this is in fact a major advantage of Black's novel. I thoroughly enjoyed it. The characters get very colourful and there is more than one you can sympathize with. Given the fact that with Lady Nevinson and Colonel Jacot we have a similar relationship as that between M and James Bond, it is funny how different this novel and the Bond movies (with Judy Dench) are. And, fair enough, there are some nice action scenes, too. It must however be said the story would not have suffered if the heavy use of alcohol in its numerous varieties would have been cut down a little ;-)
